### UPDATE FROM YOUR ENGAGEMENT OFFICER



Norfolk Constabulary targets hotspots where people feel unsafe.

Chief Constable Paul Sanford is urging Norfolk residents to use the Street Safe online tool to report areas where they feel unsafe in the county.

The Street Safe tool enables anyone to anonymously flag public places and mark on a map the areas they feel unsafe. They can remain anonymous, and while anyone can use it, women and girls are particularly being encouraged to use the online platform.

Launched by the Home Office and Police Digital Service, the tool is being piloted across England and Wales until the end of November and can be accessed by clicking on: [www.police.uk/streetsafe](http://www.police.uk/streetsafe)

### WHAT'S HAPPENING IN YOUR AREA?

I hope this latest edition of the newsletter finds you well. The Aylsham and surrounding parishes Policing Neighbourhood Policing Team have been concentrating their time on the Priorities set by the community:

- Speeding
- Anti-social/nuisance behaviour relating to drug dealing, and youths
- Safety of young pedestrians & cyclists

As the dark nights draw in marking the end of British summer time please can I remind residents to increase their vigilance around home and vehicle security. The following crime prevention advice can be used at home: Keep front and back doors locked at all times and keep keys and valuables out of sight or reach from letterboxes; Use timer switches to turn on lights before you get home, to create the illusion that someone is home; Keep curtains closed at night; Ensure your vehicle is locked and secure; On cold mornings do not leave your vehicle unattended with the engine running; Secure sheds and outbuildings with good padlocks.

Over the last month, a number of engagement surgeries have been held across the parishes in various locations. These events are a great way for members of the local community to meet with Police Officers from their local Policing Neighbourhood Team to discuss any local policing issues. Keep a look out on Broadland facebook, Nextdoor and Twitter pages for planned engagement surgeries.

The team have been focusing on increasing police visibility through our "Park Walk Talk" initiative by way of foot patrols around recreational grounds and open spaces as well as targeted mobile patrols across the parishes. During patrols, I have encountered many local residents who have stopped to have a chat with me, which is something that I actively encourage.

With the new school term under way, the police have received reports of inconsiderate/unsafe parking around the schools particularly in the Hellesdon area. Please ensure that when dropping off or picking up children at school times you park safely and sensibly. Please show care and consideration for others by keeping driveways clear to help keep the roads safe for everyone.
